Rec Center offers summer day camp

The Student Recreation Center will offer a pilot day camp program during the summer months for children grades kindergarten through six.

To be offered in two three-week sessions, June 28 to July 15 and July 26 to Aug. 12, the program will include afternoons of swimming, sailing, racquetball, canoeing, floor hockey and platform tennis, as well as runs on the outdoor fitness trail and a water slide. Also planned are tours of WBGU-TV, the College of Musical Arts, the theater department and the stadium, and a demonstration on nutrition.

The camp will run from 1-4 p.m. each day, with participants scheduled to attend six afternoons during the three-week sessions. Children will be grouped in their programs by age.

Registration for the "Youth Fun and Fitness Days" will be June 21-23 for SRC members, who may enroll their children at a cost of \$15 per child. If space is available, non-members may register June 24 and 25 at a cost of \$25 per child. A maximum of 25 children will be accepted for each session.

Ferrari receives special honors at commencement

In a surprise announcement at Saturday's commencement ceremonies, Board of Trustees President Frazier Reams announced that Interim President Ferrari would be named a Trustee Professor of Administration and be given a research leave at full salary for the calendar year beginning July 1.

In addition, Reams said that an award, to be given annually to the staff member who exhibits outstanding performance in an administrative assignment, was being established in Ferrari's name.

Reams, on behalf of the Trustees, praised Ferrari for the dedicated service he has given the University the past 11 years. "We are grateful for his loyalty to Bowling Green and, particularly during the past several months, for his patience and fine spirit of cooperation. He has provided us with a model for professional behavior."

The Trustee Professorship is given to select administrators who return to faculty status after having given outstanding administrative service to the University. Ferrari is the ninth person to be designated a Trustee Professor.

Ferrari said he would spend his year's leave at Bowling Green doing research and writing on organizational behavior. He said that he had been "wearing so many hats during the past 11 years" that he has had little time to conduct scholarly work and that "this (the leave) is a grand opportunity."

Grant supports geophysics programs

The geology department has been awarded a \$7,000 grant from the Sohio Petroleum Co. to support its undergraduate and graduate programs in geophysics.

The grant will be used for fellowship stipends, to purchase equipment and to finance student field work and other departmental activities, according to Dr. Charles Rich, geology.

Rich noted that a number of Bowling Green geology graduates are currently employed as geophysicists with such companies as Sohio.

Most offices closed, classes held on holiday

July 4, Independence Day, falls on a Sunday this year, and consistent with University policy, Bowling Green will observe the holiday on Monday, July 5.

Although most offices will be closed July 5, classes are scheduled to meet that day, and the Commuter Center, Rec Center, Health Center, Speech and Hearing Clinic, aerospace studies department, the Library and the computer services DEC, IBM and Apple labs will observe regular summer hours.

While the Instructional Media Center will be closed on July 5, student help will be available that day to deliver and operate any audio-visual equipment that is

annually in Ferrari's name will be announced at a later date.

Reams said the honors for Ferrari had been recommended by the Faculty Senate and that the board would approve them unanimously at its July meeting.

Freshmen start pre-reg July 6

The 1982 Summer Pre-Registration program for incoming freshmen and their parents will begin Tuesday, July 6, and continue through July 30.

Fifteen one-and-a-half day sessions, designed to introduce parents and students to the University, answer their questions and ease any concerns they may have, will be held. Between 180-205 new students are expected to attend each session.

During pre-registration, the students will take a battery of tests, attend informational meetings conducted by academic counselors, residence hall personnel and other administrators. Students also will have the chance to meet informally with faculty members, administrators and upperclass students, take tours of the campus and register for fall classes.

A variety of programs also is planned for parents, including the opportunity to meet with faculty in small discussion groups, see departmental demonstrations and attend presentations given by the undergraduate colleges, Residence Life and the Commuter Center, among a host of others.

Last year's pre-registration program was attended by 2,904 students and 4,132 parents. Gregg DeCrane, director of student organizations and new student programs, said he anticipates a similar number will attend this year's program.

Enrollment near 6,000

Though official figures are not yet available, it appears 1982 summer enrollment will be near last year's record level when 6,069 students attended summer classes.

Members being sought to fill PSC slots

Six vacancies on the Personnel Steering Committee must be filled in September 1982 by eligible classified staff, and applications and nominations for those positions are now being accepted.

Four of the vacancies are for full two-year terms (through September 1984). They are open to full-time classified employees as follows:

- Two to be filled from the academic area (includes employees in all colleges, student affairs and other academic areas);
- One to be filled from the custodial area of operations;
- One to be filled from the food service area of operations.

In addition, the PSC needs one full-time classified employee from the academic area to complete an unexpired term ending in September 1983.

The sixth position is for a permanent part-time staff member (non-voting) who will serve a two-year term (through September 1984). The representative of part-time employees may work in any area on campus. This non-voting position is a recent PSC membership addition.

Education department chairs reappointed

The reappointment of two department chairs in the College of Education has been announced by Dr. Sandra Packard, dean.

Dr. Gerald Saddlemire, college student personnel, and Dr. H. John van Duyne, special education, have been reappointed to four-year terms, beginning with the fall semester.

Saddlemire has served as chair of the college student personnel department since its inception in 1969. A graduate of the State University of New York at Albany, he holds master's and doctoral degrees from the Columbia University Teachers College. Prior to joining the faculty at Bowling Green, he served more than 15 years as dean of students at the State University of New York at Geneseo.

Bowling Green's college student personnel program is recognized as one of the best in the nation and its graduates have been recruited by colleges and universities throughout the United States.

Completing his first term as chair of the department of special education, van Duyne served as professor of educational psychology and director of the Learning and Cognition Laboratory at Northern Illinois University, DeKalb, before joining the Bowling Green faculty in 1978.

A graduate of Lafayette College, Easton, Pa., he holds master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Rochester and has earned international recognition for his studies of child development, educational psychology and neuropsychology.
