Faculty, staff cast in 'Brigadoon'

A cast of faculty, students, staff and area residents, under the direction of James Brown, Bowling Green High School choral director, will present "Brigadoon," Lerner and Loew's magical musical about a Scottish village that exists on just one day every 100 years, July 9-12 in Kobacker Hall of the Moore Musical Arts Center.

Curtain time is 8 p.m. July 9, 10 and 12 and 2:30 p.m. July 11. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for students and senior citizens.

Graduate music student Greg Working and Ed O'Donnell, a food service manager at the University, are cast in the lead roles for the production.

Tickets can be purchased at the Moore Musical Arts Center box office which will be open 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. July 6-10; 12:30-2:30 p.m. July 11, and 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. July 12. Reservations can be made by calling the box office 24-hour ticket hotline at 372-0171.

WBGU-TV wins three awards for outstanding achievement

WBGU-TV received three of five Oebie awards presented recently to public television stations in Ohio in recognition of outstanding achievement.

Winning the award were the "Quilting" television programs, in the educational service category; the "Quilting" promotion campaign, in the public information category; and Lincoln Pain, who received the first-ever producer's award.

The "Quilting" programs, hosted by Penny McMorris of Bowling Green, are airing nationally on approximately 100 public television stations. The 13-part series, produced by WBGU-TV, features quilting as art, demonstrations of techniques, some history of quilting and the works of numerous quilters. Paul Lopez, producer/director at WBGU, directed the television productions, which are being distributed through a grant from the Stearns & Foster Co., the Mountain Mist Product Group.

The promotional campaign for "Quilting" which won the public information award was directed by Joan H. Gordon, WBGU-TV's director of television information, and included

distribution of a viewer's guide to accompany the 13 programs.

Approximately 11,000 copies of the 72-page book, written by McMorris and edited by Gordon, have been sold.

This is the station's second Oebie Award in the public information category since the awards competition began in 1978. That year the station and Gordon were cited for a campaign to improve reception of Channel 57 in Bowling Green.

Pain, WBGU-TV's director of public and cultural affairs, received the producer's award for his work on programs including "Wide Angle," "What's an Art Curriculum For, Anyway?," "Answerline" and the "Lima Square Fair 1980."

Dr. Duane E. Tucker, general manager of WBGU-TV, accepted the awards at a ceremony in Columbus last month.

Oebie awards were created to recognize outstanding achievements in educational television and radio in Ohio in all areas of endeavor associated with the operation of an individual Ohio educational television or radio station or Ohio Educational Broadcasting.

Robert Early, English, \$6,543 from the National Endowment for the Arts to support publication of the "Mid-American Review."

Dr. Harry Hoemann, psychology, \$64,478 from the Public Health Service division of the Dept. of Health and Human Services for continued support of a project to study communication skills in deaf and hearing children.

Dr. William B. Jackson, environmental research and services, \$200 from the Dr. Davies Products Company to continue testing of Gould's Dell Flavorized Rat Kakes.
