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# Marriage Rate in the U.S., 2011

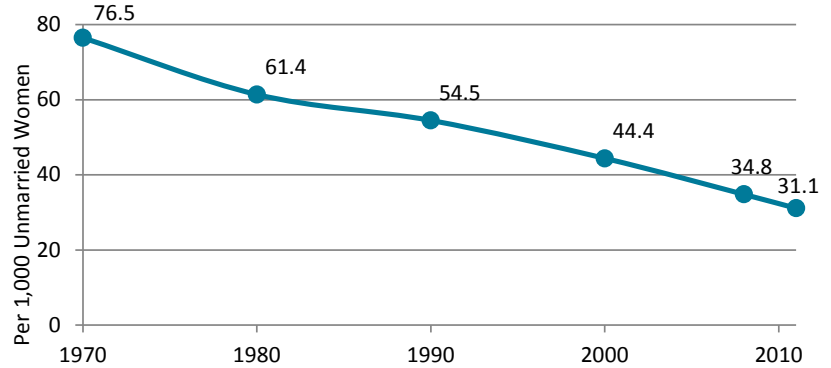

## Change in the Marriage Rate

- As of 2011, the U.S. marriage rate (the estimated proportion of marriages per 1,000 unmarried women 15 years and older) is the lowest it has been in over 40 years.
- In 2011, about 3.1% of unmarried women aged 15 and older got married. That is roughly 31 marriages per 1,000 unmarried women. In 2008, about 3.5% of unmarried women got married – roughly 35 marriages per 1,000 unmarried women. In the previous three years, the marriage rate has declined by approximately 11% from 34.8 to 31.1.
- In 2011, 2,096,359 women aged 15 and older got married out of 67,373,383 unmarried women. In 2008, 2,227,084 women aged 15 and older got married out of 64,029,223 unmarried women. These numbers suggest that although there were more single women in 2011 than in 2008, fewer were tying the knot in 2011.

## Five States with the Highest and Lowest Marriage Rate, 2011

- In Utah, about 61 women per 1,000 unmarried women over the age of 15 were married. That is, roughly 6.1% of unmarried women were married in 2011.
- In Washington, D.C., about 19 women per 1,000 unmarried women over the age of 15 were married. About 1.9% of unmarried women were married in 2011.

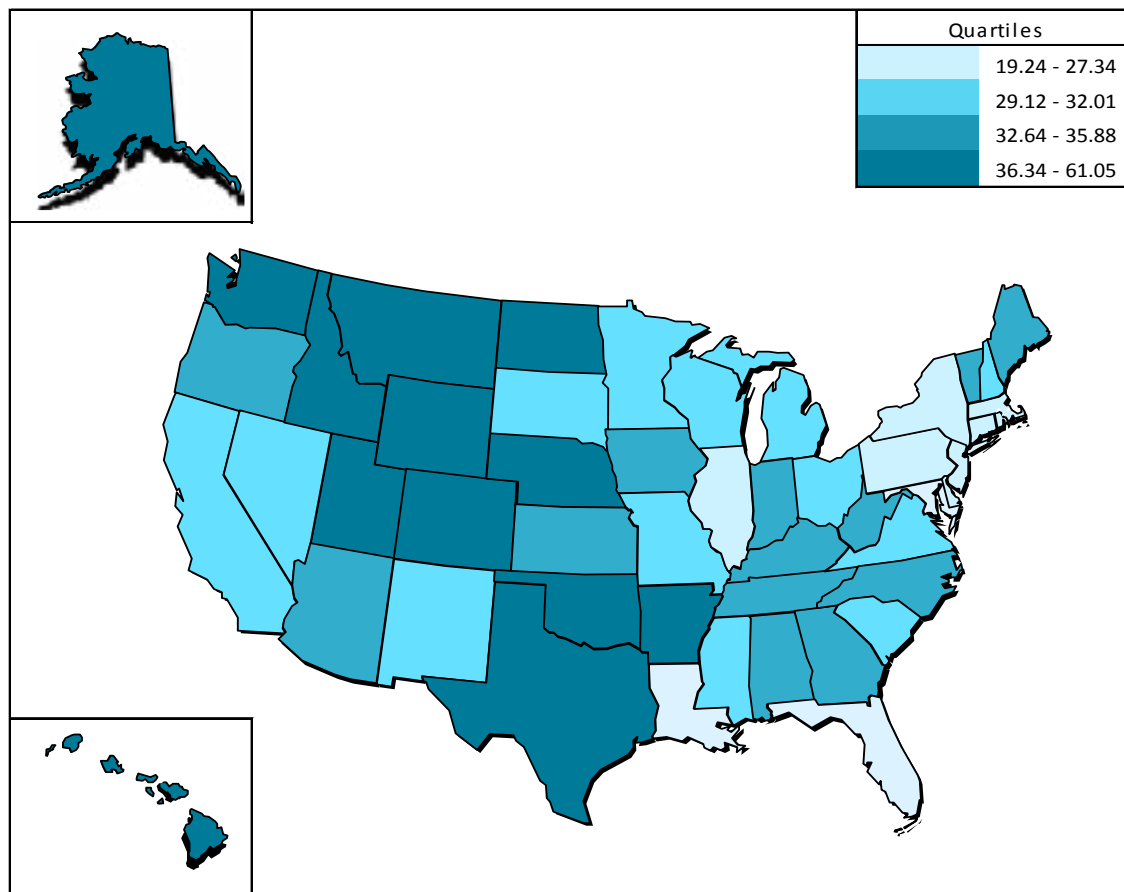
## State Changes in Ranking from 2008 to 2011

- Three out of the five states with the highest marriage rates in 2011 (Utah, Wyoming, and North Dakota) also had the highest marriage rates in 2008.
- Rhode Island, Washington, D.C., and New York were each one of the five states with the lowest marriage rates in 2008 and 2011.
- The vast majority of states experienced decreases in their marriage rates from 2008 to 2011, with rates for Idaho and Wyoming decreasing the most. Nine states experienced increased rates, with Alaska and Hawaii experiencing the greatest increases.
  - Idaho moved from 3rd to 6th highest ranking (56.57 to 45.24)
  - Wyoming moved from 2nd to 4th highest ranking (59.43 to 45.93)
  - Alaska moved from 7th to 2nd highest ranking (47.81 to 56.31)
  - Hawaii moved from 31st to 7th highest ranking (35.36 to 43.17)

### Geographic Variation of the U.S. Marriage Rate, 2011

- Among states with the highest marriage rates, the largest share is located in the western region of the U.S. (Utah, Alaska, Wyoming, Idaho, Hawaii, Colorado, Montana, and Washington).
- Among states with the lowest marriage rate, the largest share is located in the northeastern region of the U.S. (Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Connecticut, and Rhode Island).
