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Fuerst and Bae are named to endowed business professorships

Two professors in the College of Business Administration have been named to endowed professorships, dean James A. Sullivan has announced.

Timothy Fuerst, economics, has been named the Owens-Illinois Professor and Sung Bae, chair of the Department of Finance, has been named the Ashel G. Bryan/Mid American Bank Professor.

The endowed professorships recognize outstanding faculty members by providing them with professional opportunities to enhance teaching and scholarship in the field of business administration.

To be considered, a faculty member must have established a reputation as an outstanding teacher-scholar, have made significant contributions to the understanding and/or practice of some aspect of business and have a record of meaningful interaction with and contributions to the business community.

Since its creation in 1986 with a gift from Owens-Illinois Inc., the Owens-Illinois Professorship at BGSU had been held

by Chan Hahn, who recently retired as chair of the Department of Management.

Sullivan said that Fuerst was chosen for the Owens-Illinois Professorship in recognition of his sustained record of excellence in teaching and service and because "his research has produced an impressive body of important work on monetary theory and policy, earning him national and international recognition."

Fuerst is a member of the editorial board of the American Economic Review and serves as a consultant for the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland. In 1999 he was invited by the Central Bank of Chile to present

his work on inflation targeting at a monetary-policy conference in Santiago with faculty from Oxford, Johns Hopkins, Stanford and Ohio State universities.

In January of this year he traveled to Europe at the invitation of the Central Bank of Portugal to teach a week-long series of classes on monetary theory for regional doctoral students and central bank staff from a number of European countries.

The Ashel G. Bryan/Mid American Bank Professorship recognizes an outstanding faculty member in the College of Business Administration, with a preference for teacher-scholars focusing on the field of finance. Established in 1990 with a gift from Mid American Bank, the endowed professorship was most recently held by Daniel P. Klein, finance.

Sullivan noted that Bae's distinguished record, which includes exceptional research accomplishments as well as leadership and service to the Department of Finance, the college, the University and the profession, led to his selection for the endowed professorship.

Bae joined the BGSU faculty in 1987. His teaching expertise includes corporate finance, personal financial planning and international financial management. His research focuses on new equity issues, investment banking contracts and domestic and international corporate restructuring.

Bae has received the Competitive Paper Award in Corporate Finance from the Financial Management Association and is a two-time recipient of the College of Business Administration's Robert A. Patton Scholastic Achievement Award for outstanding research.

He serves on the executive board of the Korea-America Finance Association and has held key leadership positions in the Korean Association of Greater Toledo. Since 1995, Bae has served as an adviser to the Center for Future Human Resource Studies in Seoul, Korea. He also has been active in employee and executive training programs for Mercy Health Partners, the Samsung Group and Korean Airlines.



Paul Krebs, director of intercollegiate athletics, has announced an agreement between BGSU athletics and ESPN regional television that will result in three additional Falcon football games being broadcast this fall.

Krebs and BGSU head football coach Gary Blackney were joined at a news conference in Bowling Green Aug. 3 by Dan Shoemaker, general manager of ESPN Regional Television's Creative Productions division, and Mid-American Conference Commissioner Jack Chryst.

The addition of the three games—Pittsburgh on Sept. 9, Temple on Sept. 16 and Marshall on Nov. 4—brings the total of televised Falcon games to five.

Already scheduled for broadcast were the season opener against Michigan on Sept. 2 and the regular-season finale at Toledo on Nov. 22.

The Pittsburgh game will be televised on a regional network of stations, including TV-5 (WB) in Toledo, and will be the ESPN regional television Big East Conference Game of the Week. Thirty-five stations, from Bangor, Maine to Tampa, Fla., will air the game, which has been rescheduled to begin at noon.

"This is an excellent opportunity to be involved with Bowling Green State University and the greater Toledo area," said Shoemaker. "We believe Bowling Green is one of the up-and-coming schools in the Mid-American Conference."

The agreement is the outgrowth of the MAC's deal with ESPN/ESPN Regional. Earlier this summer, the MAC signed a three-year, production and programming deal with ESPN.

Meters, street changes to enhance convenience and safety

There are some changes in store for campus drivers regarding parking meters and reserved parking for those with disabilities, as well as some street changes, according to Stacie Enriquez, manager of the University's parking and traffic division.

Faculty, staff and students who have brief business in the Administration Building or on the west end of campus will soon find parking easier with the installation of metered spots in Lot E, Enriquez said. About 35 meters will be installed during the weeks between summer and fall semesters for the rows facing Thurstin Avenue and Court Street. Enriquez predicted minimal disruption of parking during the installation.

Designed to help people get in and out quickly, the meters will cost 25 cents per half-hour, with a two-hour maximum parking limit.

Also, in order to standardize parking meters throughout campus, other meters that now take nickels and dimes will be converted to the quarter-only

models. Most of these are on the east end of campus, around Harshman and Kreischer quadrangles and behind the fraternity houses.

Enriquez said she anticipates the change being completed by the beginning of school in order to minimize inconvenience.

In compliance with the Ohio Revised Code, the fine for parking without the appropriate, state-issued placard in a spot reserved for those with disabilities has been raised to a minimum of \$250, Enriquez said. Although the University has never had a serious problem with this, the goal is to present a deterrent to any who might be tempted to disregard regulations on the reserved spots.

Elsewhere, the fine for parking at an expired meter is \$10.

In other news, two streets heavily used by pedestrians will be made one-way in order to reduce congestion and increase safety, Enriquez said.

• North College Drive between Ridge Street and Merry Avenue will be one-way headed north.

• Ridge Street between North College and Thurstin will be one-way headed east.

She said the goal is to have these changes in place by the beginning of the fall semester.

Plan ahead for tornado safety

A new tornado siren has been installed on the east end of campus near the Ice Arena to alert employees, students and visitors that a funnel cloud has been seen in the area.

The siren will be tested at 10 a.m. on the first Saturday of each month along with other city and county sirens. If the siren activates at other than testing times, seek a tornado shelter in a nearby building.

Event organizers should plan tornado shelters in advance. Consider which nearby buildings are open at the time of the event and whether the posted shelter areas will house the number of people needing shelters. Organizers of large events will need to consider outdoor shelters such as the one under the east (Interstate 75 side) of the stadium. Contact the stadium in advance to gain access to the stadium gates.
