Faculty achievements are rewarded by peers

Five of the University's outstanding faculty members were honored March 26 for their contributions to the community. At the Faculty Recognition Award luncheon, attended by more than 100 faculty members, each honoree was presented a plaque and a check for \$1,000.

- The Lifetime Achievement Award went to M. Neil Browne, Distinguished Teaching Professor of economics, for his 33 years of excellence in teaching, scholarly and creative work and service to the campus community. Browne, who has won numerous teaching awards at BGSU as well as nationally, has published in the areas of economics, critical thinking, environmental issues and business ethics.

- Another long-time faculty member received the award for community involvement. Lee Meserve, Distinguished Teaching Professor of biological sciences, was recognized for his 28 years of unflagging efforts in teaching, mentoring, research and service. Meserve, the recipient of the 1992 Master Teacher Award and the 1998 College of Arts and Sciences Faculty Excellence Award, has taught 11 different courses in the department and has served as undergraduate pre-health professional adviser since 1983. He has served not only the College of Arts and Sciences but also the College of Health and Human Services.

- Ronald Shields, chair of the theatre department, was recognized in the chair/school-

director leadership category. At BGSU, effective leaders must consider and balance the needs of campus-wide, department, faculty and student constituencies, and Shields has achieved an impressive success in all these areas. He is particularly strong in innovation in graduate curriculum, skillful managing of department resources, effective chairing of an interdisciplinary program and faculty mentoring.

- Peter Shields, chair of the telecommunications department, received the Faculty Mentor Award, for his mentoring of both students and other faculty members. A favorite adviser for students, he also helps recruit them to his department. As a mentor for junior faculty he provides encouragement, wise advice and hands-on assistance. He also models the ability to balance research and teaching, actively publishing in the academic community.

- Nancy Boudreau, director of the Statistical Consulting Center, was selected as winner of the Unit Recognition Award. Boudreau has directed the center since 1986, providing service to faculty and graduate students, while making major contributions to her clients' research and at the same time teaching those clients how statistics can be used to answer their research questions. She has a very broad knowledge of statistics and computer operations, which she applies to assist researchers from all disciplines with statistical applications to their research.

Outstanding classified staff members are recognized

Classified staff met March 27 for their annual awards ceremony and Classified Staff Council scholarship presentations.

Cindy Koontz, bursar's office, was honored with the Outstanding Service Award. She received \$1,000, a plaque and a reserved parking space for a year. Koontz was lauded for being a hard-working and caring employee with a contagious positive attitude, who reaches out to mentor and motivate others.

The Team Award was presented to the Harshman custodial staff, whose members include Jane Adamczak, Carol Bowser, Debra Browne, Wayne Freshcorn, Angela Heyman, Susan Orwig, Debra Potter, Virginia Roberts, Mary Sanchez, Sheri Souder and Dave Tracy. The team received a plaque and will share a \$1,000 cash prize.

Nominators wrote that many of the team members are on a first-name basis with the hall's residents and staff members, and truly care about student con-

cerns within the halls. Supervisor Carol Bowser was credited for her quiet leadership and inner strength, which have helped produce a solid, dependable, efficient, and well-liked custodial staff.

The council also presented 11 \$250 scholarship awards, with three going to staff mem-
