China course opened to staff, community

A course entitled Modern Chinese Life to be taught by a visiting professor from the People's Republic of China has been opened to faculty and staff of the University as well as the Bowling Green community.

The course will be taught by Professor Sun Tian-yi, a vice president of the Xi'an Foreign Languages Institute. Sun is

participating in the foreign exchange program that he helped establish between his institution and Bowling Green two years ago. Sun's course, offered in the fall term on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4 to 5:30 p.m., will examine modern Chinese life from the perspective of literature, the arts, history and Chinese popular culture. The course is offered by the College of Arts and Sciences through the English Department.

Lester Barber, chair, English, said Sun's visit to the University is intended to help develop interest in the exchange program as well as expose the University community to Chinese culture.

Dr. Barber said Sun will serve as a consultant to any University department or office developing a curriculum having to do with China. Sun will also be available to talk to faculty wishing to participate in the exchange program.

"This is the first time we have had someone here as a visiting professor," Dr. Barber said, noting that in the past Chinese participants in the program have come to Bowling Green as graduate students.

"My hope is that this will help advertise the University's curriculum in Asian studies, in history and language," said Dr. Barber. "Our goal is to promote a long-range interest in Asian studies.

"It's a great opportunity to acquaint our students and the community with an international perspective, a global view."

Dr. Barber described Sun as a "very interesting, outgoing person," who is "extraordinarily westernized by Chinese

standards."

"He's miles ahead of his colleagues," Dr. Barber said of Sun. "I think he will be superb in the classroom.

"He has that knack of establishing contact with a person quickly. He can carry on a conversation generally with anyone."

Dr. Barber also said Sun's command of the English language is very good. "He can use colloquialisms we're familiar with. He is the most fluent of all the Chinese the University has had here."

The Xi'an Foreign Languages Institute, a school of about 1,500 students, is located about 700 miles southwest of China's capital of Beijing (Peking). The city of Xi'an has about 3 million residents.

Bowling Green is one of three universities in the country to participate in the Chinese exchange program. Northern Illinois and Brigham Young universities also participate. Bowling Green has a similar program in genetics with Fudan University in Shanghai.

Obituaries

George Postich, 54, former vice president for operations, died Tuesday, Aug. 13, in Cleveland.

Postich, who retired as a captain after a 23-year career in the U.S. Navy, came to Bowling Green in 1975 and left the University in 1983. He had been living in the Cleveland area since leaving Bowling Green.

A graduate of the Harvard University MBA program and a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Postich replaced J. Claude Scheuerman at the University. Postich successfully guided the operations area through some severe times, particularly the energy crunch of the late 1970s, which greatly pinched the resources of the University's buildings and facilities area.

He is survived by his wife, Marge, and seven children.

Burial was in Arlington National Cemetery.

H. John van Duyne, former chair of the department of special education in the College of Education, died Aug. 7 in a Pasadena, Calif., hospital after a lengthy illness.

Dr. van Duyne came to Bowling Green in 1978 from Northern Illinois University. During his tenure as chair, the department of special education gained national and state prominence for the extent of its research efforts and the quality and innovativeness of its teacher preparatory programs.

In 1983, Dr. van Duyne left the University to become executive director of the Marianne Frostig Center in Pasadena.

He is survived by his wife, Susan, two daughters and a sister.
