## Marland named year's top producer

WBGU-TV producer Denise Marland recently won her second Producer of the Year award in three years from the Ohio Educational Broadcasting Commission.

The honor was one of three OEBIE awards received by WBGU-TV for 1985. The annual awards recognize outstanding achievements in educational television and radio throughout Ohio.

Marland has been involved in several major productions, weekly program series, closed circuit programs and a major docu-drama in the past year. She produced and directed a one hour docu-drama about writer Sinclair Lewis and his works, and a musical variety program featuring the 11th Annual Bishop Luers Swing Choir Invitational. She also produced a live two-hour program highlighting the University's

75th anniversary, as well as an industrial program for a major tire company.

Marland also received the Producer of the Year Award in 1983. This year's honor represents the fifth consecutive Producer of the Year Award granted to a WBGU-TV producer.

The station also received this year the Technical Achievement Award and the Educational Service Award. The technical achievement honor was granted for the design and implementation of the station's new Remote Production Mobile Unit.

This unique mobile system allows the station's remote production equipment to function as a separate unit and replaced a 17-year-old self-contained truck. The unit is a trailer, which is pulled by a large pro-

up truck.

WBGU-TV received the service honor for "News Six," a weekly 10-minute program written and performed by sixth grade students from member schools of the Northwest Ohio Educational Technology Foundation. "News Six" was created to showcase the schools and small cities and towns in the station's 19-county coverage area, and to help students appreciate the career field of television.

Also, Margaret Tucker, who headed the NWOETF from 1970-1984, received the Commissioner's OEBIE Award for dedication and commitment to instructional television in Ohio. The NWOETF serves 142 school districts and 147,000 students.


## Dow Chemical funds scholarships

For the second time in four years, the Dow Chemical Company Foundation has awarded \$5,000 in scholarship funding to the University for incoming freshmen interested in pursuing advanced studies in chemistry.

In addition, Dow has given the chemistry department \$1,000 to fund seminars and \$1,500 for undergraduate student summer research.

Since 1982, five students have received Dow scholarships, which brings the current funding total to \$24,000.

"The students who receive these scholarships want to become professional chemists," said Douglas Neckers, chair, chemistry. "We set very high standards and these are highly motivated, top caliber students."



**Honorary Recipient:** R. Bruce Merrifield (c), winner of the 1984 Nobel Prize in Chemistry, received an honorary doctor of science degree June 3. Known throughout the world for his pioneering research in chemistry, Dr. Merrifield was the main speaker during the 18th Central Regional Meeting of the American Chemical Society on campus last week. President Paul J. Olscamp presented the degree with Douglas Neckers, chair, chemistry, bestowing the honorary hood. Dr. Merrifield is the John D. Rockefeller Jr. Professor at Rockefeller University in New York.

Job descriptions for classified employees will be reviewed as part of the development of a new classification system by the H.B. 309 Committee of the Classified Staff Council.

The H.B. 309 Committee is so named for state House Bill 309, which was passed in 1985 and gives the University the power to establish compensation plans, including schedules of hourly rates, for classified employees. The committee was appointed to represent classified employees in developing a plan in consultation with the administration.

At a recent meeting of the committee, members decided that many classification descriptions do not match the jobs to which they are assigned.
