Senate sees need to attract more minorities

Recognizing a need to attract more ethnic minority students into Bowling Green programs, Faculty Senate passed a resolution at its Dec. 16 meeting calling on the University to continue the development and refinement of special curricular programs for these students.

President Olscamp, who attended the meeting, spoke in support of the resolution noting the University has taken steps to improve its recruitment of minority students. Programs need to be developed to attract minority students to the campus and keep them here, he said.

In order for the resolution to succeed, senators agreed it must be transmitted to the community at large in alerting both Bowling Green and minorities that BGSU is open. The resolution also suggests departments should focus on hiring minority faculty, and current Bowling Green students should be used in recruitment efforts to return to their high schools with information about BGSU.

In other business, Olscamp addressed the senate on two resolutions recently passed by the Board of Trustees.

Olscamp said the first resolution, dealing with the salary book, drew out of concern by two board members regarding the format in which the board is asked to approve the salary book subsequent to its approval each June.

Olscamp said he requested the policy that resulted in the second resolution outlining procedures to be followed by board members in hearing from constituents outside of its regular meetings. He said it was important for him to be well informed of the concerns expressed by University constituencies to trustees. Prior to the resolution, he had difficulty responding appropriately when information was presented at board meetings without prior notification to allow time for preparation of a response.

Concept approved

Classified Staff Council gave a vote of approval at its Dec. 16 meeting to the concept of the H.B. 309 proposal. The approval allows the H.B. 309 Committee to continue working out the details of the draft which will establish a compensation plan for classified employees.

The 19-member 309 Committee had requested the vote as an indication of whether the current progress on the draft was acceptable. A completed version of the proposal is expected to be presented to the council sometime in January or February.

Council previously had received an endorsement from CSC's Personnel Welfare Committee for approval of the concept.

In other business:

— Members specified in a vote that the council's annual scholarship be awarded to a classified employee, spouse or dependents.

— Cindy Richards, philosophy documentation, was appointed as the council's representative to the University Safety Committee.

— An appointment is needed for CSC's Election Committee. Interested candidates should send self-nominations to CSC, Box 91.

Trustees offer Dr. Olscamp new five-year contract

The Board of Trustees voted Dec. 12 to offer President Olscamp a new five-year contract when his current agreement expires on June 30, 1987.

Trustee J. Warren Hall of Cleveland said a subcommittee of the board will negotiate the extension with Olscamp. Herbert Moorehead of Dayton and Melvin Murray of Fostoria will represent the trustees in the contract discussions.

The vote to extend the contract was 7-1, with trustee Virginia Platt opposing the motion. She said it was premature for the board to negotiate a new contract and that the timing was not right.

Hall said the talks will not include salary discussions but will focus on "updating the current contract which was written five years ago."

Hall said the board is "very pleased" with his (Olscamp's) work as president of the University.

The board also approved a personnel budget for 1987-88 totaling \$72.1 million, based on recommendations from the Faculty Senate Budget Committee and University Budget Committee. The 1987-88 budget is an increase of .92 percent over the current year's allocations. It does not reflect any salary increases for faculty, administrative and classified staff and graduate student stipends. Those will be determined in the spring. Instead, it sets a personnel base that is not to exceed that \$72.1 million approved by the board and in essence sets the number of faculty and staff positions for the coming year.

In other action, the trustees approved naming a room in the proposed addition to the Business Administration Building "The Dana Executive Seminar Room." The recommendation was made in recognition of the Dana Corporation's \$50,000 gift to the University toward construction of the building addition and to symbolize the close working relationship between Dana and the University. A Dana/BGSU master's program in business administration has been offered since 1976, with more than 100 employees from Dana participating since that time.

Approval also was given to a resolution which requires male students who are Ohio residents and have not registered with the Selective Service to be charged a fee equivalent to the nonresident fee and provides that the University will not receive state subsidy for those students. In addition, students in violation of H.B. 845 will be denied a fee waiver if they would otherwise be eligible. The law is effective this semester.

Also approved were an updated and revised purchasing manual for the University and a letter of intent which lays the groundwork for Wood Cable TV to provide service to the campus.

Bowling Green Mayor Bruce Bellard reported to the board, which met in the Bowling Green Junior High School auditorium, on the positive relationship between the University and the city. The off-campus meeting site was selected to further that relationship.

In his report to the trustees Olscamp noted that undergraduate enrollment projections for spring and fall 1987 are optimistic.

He announced that the National Association of Industrial Technology Board of Accreditation has approved reaccreditation of the University's industrial technology program for six years, effective October 1986 and reported that a search committee for affirmative action director has been chosen. Olscamp said a new affirmative action director should be appointed this month.

The president expressed concern about the state budget allocations for 1987-88, noting that he is "not at all optimistic" about passage of the Ohio Board of Regents' budget recommendations "considering early reports on projected revenue to the state general fund for 1988-89." The regents had recommended for Bowling Green an appropriation of \$59.5 million for 1988 and \$65.4 million for 1989.

The next meeting of the board is scheduled on Jan. 16.

Graduate students' art on display

The 1987 Graduate Student Art Show opens Jan. 11 at the Fine Arts Building. A reception for the artists will be held from 7:30-9:30 p.m. Jan. 16. The public is invited to attend.

Sixteen students will be showing their work. They include Richard Cannistra, John Cunningham, Sister Sharon Havelak, Michele Etris, Tom Madden, Anita O'Brien,

Sally Phillips, CeCe Rutherford, David Wolfe, Anthony Bouillon, Tim Johnson, Debra Zappitelli, Cindy Marso, Joan McKee, Murray Morgan and Erin Palmer.

The juried exhibition will be on display through Jan. 30. Gallery hours are 9 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and 2-5 p.m. Sundays. The gallery is closed on Saturdays. Admission is always free.

Dr. Patricia Matthew, an assistant professor of art history at Oberlin College, will jury the show.
