## A Part Of Our Education

This year, in a greater effort to appeal to the tastes of college students, a more modern opera has been scheduled for the Artist Series
"Madame Butterfly" has a setting of the early nineteenth century and a more modern plot, one more understandable to the present generations. With the added aid of English dialogue, we should have a better understanding of what the action of the story is about.

Perhaps the difficulty in understanding the plots of operas is one reason Americans in general have taken dislike to this aspect of what is often called "culture."

Whether you like opera or not-and especially if you have never seen an opera-"Madame Butterfly" is your opportunity. If President Eisenhower were to come to this campus to give a political speech, wouldn't you attend the speech primarily to see him in person? Why then, especially if you have never seen an opera, should you not attend just to see what it's all about?

An opera is a gigantic production. It includes settings and lighting; vocal solos, duets, quartets, and choruses; and dancing and acting. Certainly

## Concerning Polio

Even though the polio status is above normal in Bowling Green at the present, it has been reported that it is considerably below epidemic proportions.

Bowling Green did not experience many cases of the disease this summer. In fact, the number was lower than it has been for several summers. The first case was not reported until mid-August. The recent cases involving three persons from this University-only one of whom lives on campus-does not, therefore, suggest a trend for this area.

The University physicians, however, advise that students take certain precautions, and suggest that students avoid rigorous physical exertion and unnecessary strain, get extra rest, and otherwise

The structure will be of brick and glass construction wit
ground－to－roof panel expanses glass and glass block．Brick and limestone will develop the front and back of the structure，which is to have a truly modern style，
yet keeping to the mode of the rest of the campus．

Four floors are included in
the original plans，which call for a recital hall，capable of seating 250 persons， 60 practice and re－ cital rooms， 14 studios， 14 class－
rooms，office space and rooms．
At present the music department is located in the Practical Arts
Bldg．with the economics and business departments．Over 650 students are enrolled in music courses，taking private lessons zations．There are 20 faculty nembers in the department，which is fully accredited by the National
