# Clinton builds case for Haitian invasion

WASHINGTON -- In a terse ultimatum from the Oval Office, President Clinton told Haiti's military leaders Thursday night, "Your time is up. Leave now or we will force you from power."

Against a chorus of opposition, Clinton used a prime-time address to build his case for an American invasion of Haiti to expel a military regime that stole power and stands accused of 3,000 political murders.

"We must act," Clinton said in televised address from the Oval

Forces would help train civilian police mission in Haiti would be "li- makes decisions like this one mited and specific" to "remove the dictators from power and restore Haiti's legitimate demo-

cratically elected government." He said U.S. forces would help train a civilian police force, but would not get involved in rebuilding Haiti.

Clinton said the "vast majority of our troops will come home in months, not years." Upwards of 20,000 U.S. force were mobilized

"I assure you that no president

without deep thought and prayer," the president said. "But it is my job as president and commander in chief to take those action that I believe will best protect our national security in-

Lt. Gen. Raoul Cedras, leader of the military junta, cautioned the United States not to invade. In a CBS interview, Cedras said, "I will fight with my people and I am prepared to die.

McDonald sought help from David's House staff members and volunteers to cope with his substance abuse and the many different problems surrounding life with the HIV virus. He has since gained a new perspective on life.

"When you walk through the door of David's House, love just smacks you in the face," McDonald said.

profit organization in Toledo that provides social services to people with HIV and AIDS, has been able to help many other people in similar situa-

Serving over 230 people in Northwest Ohio, including 39 women and 12 children, David's House assists its clients by providing a huge range of services, said Beyerly Nathan, executive director of David's

These services include case management, financial assis-tance, in-home health care aid, transportation and visiting patients in the hospital or even at their homes, Nathan said. "We assist clients with nu-

trition programs by providing them with food supplements, coupons and a food pantry," she said. "In addition, when a client is about to move into a new apartment, we help them with rental assistance, buy them furniture to help furnish the apartment, utility hookups and even house cleaning. We also take them to and from doctor appointments if they do not have a car or are unable to

# Former president still active

Editor's Note: This is the second part in a continuing series about people who have made an impact on the University.

Twenty-five years after William Travers Jerome III, the main library's namesake, resigned as University president, the 75-year-old professor continues to teach organizational management at a Florida uni-

Born in New York City in 1919, Jerome attended Colgate University in New York as an undergraduate. After being drafted for three years, he attended Yale University Law School and received his Ph.D. from the Harvard School of Business.

Following his years as a student, Jerome was a professor and the dean of the college of business at Syracuse Universi-

During his seven years as University president, Jerome impacted the University on a permanent basis.

"He made a tremendous impact on Bowling Green from 1963-70," said Clifton Boutelle, director of public relations. "During his tenure we had one of the biggest building booms in the history of the Universi-

Both physically and mentally, that building boom affected the entire moral of the University. Jerome began the talk for and eventually the new construction of a library, emphasizing the importance of undergraduate studies.

Along with the library, both innovative and traditional architecture were developed for more than 10 buildings which cost about \$35 million. Among those buildings was the Student Services Building.

Jerome can also be credited with the conception of the Firelands campus, which was planned and constructed during his administration.

"Looking back, I'd have to express the great excitement I had working with and helping eager people in the Firelands project," said Jerome in a phone interview. "We had to raise the money for such a marvelous project, and it was of good fortune to be a part of

"I try to be honest, simple, direct, nothing more -- and this is extremely confusing to most people," Jerome said at the time.

In his seven-year term, Jerome increased effectiveness of teaching at the undergraduate level with the concepts of the new library, experimental classrooms and labs, improved potential teaching qualities which included television teaching, pass/no-pass courses, the honors program and audio-visual aids.

Jerome started the idea of having student representation on all major policy bodies and was involved in keeping the University an open forum.

Jerome's involvement with the student body seemed to catch on to outsiders while the enrollment of on-campus students rose from 8,238 students to 13,600 students, and the number of faculty members

"He was successful because he spoke to the students and kept the dialogue and communication lines open." Boutelle

Jerome's concern for the welfare of the students centered around the environment at the University.

"I have always said that the students, people and faculty in that part of Ohio were wonderful people to work with - they held a really strong sense of values," Jerome said. "I felt closer to the soil there, to the people and the students."

The importance of Jerome was sensed outside the University, as well, when a committee was formed in 1970 endorsing Jerome for the governorship of

In October of 1969, Jerome announced his resignation from the presidency to accept the position as a special consultant to his former assistant, Charles Perry, in Florida.

After Jerome left Bowling Green in 1970, his career was far from over. Avoiding the administrative aspects of education, Jerome was on the committee to start the Florida International University.

Brinkley, 40, told USA Today she and Taubman became engaged only a couple of weeks after they met.

"He's a wonderful, honest, generous, great person," the newspaper quoted her in Wednesday's editions.

After the crash, Brinkley told People magazine, "Maybe I'll have the patience to be a better mom. Maybe I will simplify my life, because at the moment everything is so sweet to me."

Brinkley and Joel have not disclosed what arrangements they made for custody of their 8-yearold daughter, Alexa Ray.

## Students killed

MADISON, Maine -- A stateowned dump truck slammed into a car Wednesday, killing five high school students on their way to school.

The victims were "all excellent students and real good athletes," said Police Chief Harley Dunlap. "It's a real tragedy to this com-

There was no indication either vehicle was speeding, he said. Dunlap didn't anticipate any charges being filed against the uninjured driver of the state Department of Transportation truck.

## ACROSS THE NATION

There is a stop sign at the intersection where the collision occurred, but investigators couldn't immediately determine if the car had stopped, Dunlap said. There is no obstruction to visibility at the intersection, he

Three of the victims, including the driver of the car, were 17. The others were 14 and 15.







# ROTC presents Military Appreciation Day display

With the cold war over and no large military threat against the United States, many of today's college students are still exploring the options available to them through the military.

Saturday is Military Appreciation Day at the University. Students will have a chance to see military equipment and ask any questions they may have about the armed forces at a Reserved Officer Training Corp display outside Doyt L. Perry Stadium.

Maj. Nick "Hurricane" Harris, a military science instructor at the University, said a helicopter, an armored personnel carrier and a command vehicle have been borrowed from the Walbridge National Guard Armory for the display.

"[Through the display] we are saying thanks for showing us

plays and we can show you what we do and how we use the equipment," Harris said.

Harris, who teaches freshman and sophomore military science classes, said in recent years he has seen a definite rise in interest in the military among college students.

"I would say students have a positive view of the military," Harris said. "This year we have 134 students in Military Science 101. I think that's the largest number we've had in that class."

Harris said some students take Military Science 101 due to the adventure training in the class, such as rapelling and fire weapons, while other students take it to explore the scholarship options available to them through the University's ROTC program.

Harris said 203 students are involved in the University ROTC program. The program pays a large portion of a student's college fees in exchange for mili-

tary service upon graduation. Harris said a student must serve eight years in the armed force., four of which can be served in the reserves.

Harris said college students involved in the ROTC program have a definite advantage in attaining a job in the very competitive workforce.

"Fortune 500 companies tenatively pick a military officer over their peers because of the leadership responsibilities entrusted to them," Harris said. "Coming out of the military you are a much more articulate decision maker than someone who has just graduated from college." Scott Hartwell, a cadet corporal in the University ROTC program, said the program instills people with qualities that can be used long after their military careers.

"You learn leadership skills, as well as time management and problem solving that you're going to use all through your life."

## University student regains health, inspires others

To his friends and family, Paul Mortimer is an inspiration.

Seven years ago, he was in a motorcycle accident which killed a passenger and left him in a wheelchair. Though being declared clinically dead numerous times, he fought back and regained his health.

Admitting he has made mistakes, Mortimer is quick to dismiss the past for hopes of the future.

Mortimer, a University student, said he is working toward a degree in social work. He has always had goals of counseling people in rehabilitation.

He advocates responsibility in drug and alcohol use and stresses the need for moderation, he said.

A large part of the success he has had is due, in part, to the constant love and support of family

and friends.


"It's basically like being a buddy to the family [of the MS patient]," Baringer said. "We're all really excited about it."

In addition to providing many services, David's House also operates a residence for five people who are all HIV positive, Nathan said.

The residents of the home, which is limited to five residents as a result of current licensure capabilities, are all people who require some kind of assisted liv-

"Most of these residents do not have any friends or family to help care for them," Nathan said. "So we provide them with a place to live and have staff members with them 24 hours a day who do their laundry, cook their meals and assist them with their health

While some may be under the impression that working with the terminally ill would be a depressing job, Nathan said it is just the opposite.

"Although it is very, very sad sometimes because we have so many losses, I honestly feel as if we are making a difference in so many lives and that is reassuring," she said. "While we cannot change the outcome of the illness, we can make a difference in our clients' quality of life while they are still living."
Even though David's House

has a paid staff of 17 and a team of 120 volunteers who donate

over 2500 hours of service per month, Nathan said the staff believes they get back everything

they put into it.
"Working with the terminally ill has given all of us the chance to know the meaning of true friendship," she said. "Once people realize that they have a time limit on their lives, they have a tendency to open up more and express all of the things that they normally wouldn't have since they do not know if they will ever have the chance to say them again. They are really special relationships."

McDonald said he wishes there would be more places like David's House available to people with HIV and AIDS.



# Comic Burns keeps nurses in stitches, recovery imminent

LOS ANGELES -- George Burns sat up in his hospital bed and joked with nurses Wednesday, two days after surgery to drain fluid from his brain. The 98-year-old entertainer was expected to be home within a week.

Doctors planned to move the comic from intensive care to a private room on Thursday.

Neurologist Martin Cooper and Burns' personal physician Gary Sugarman "expressed their satisfaction with how well George is doing following the surgery," said Ron Wise, spokesman for Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, bordered by George Burns Road. "He has steadily improved," Wise said.

Burns will continue his recuperation at his Beverly Hills home for a week or two once he's released.

Irving Fein, Burns' longtime friend and manager, told reporters at a hospital news conference that Burns ate breakfast and sat up telling jokes.

"He's had three or four nurses and he's doing his act. He's singing some of his songs that he

does in his act. They are all laughing. He's having a good time," he said.

Fein canceled Burns' Sept. 30 performance at the Foxwood casino in Connecticut and an Oct. 4 luncheon at the Plaza Hotel in New York. But Burns will likely make Ft. Lauderdale and Tampa dates in November, he said.

"I'm sure he'll be able to do the Caesars on his 99th birthday on Jan. 20," Fein said of Burns' date at the Las Vegas casino. Burns also is scheduled for 100th birthday celebration performances in 1996

The cigar-chomping comic underwent surgery after being admitted Monday night. The operation relieved pressure from fluid that built up after he fell in his bathtub and hit his head on a soap dish July 13.

Burns' speech was impaired for a few days after the fall but it came back. The non-emergency operation was performed after the speech troubles returned.

Through much of his career, Burns was straight man to his wife, Gracie Allen, who died in 1964. He won an Academy Award in 1975 for "The Sunshine Boys."

## Search continues for cause of crash

CORAOPOLIS, Pa. – More than 20 people sweated in the afternoon heat of a hangar near the Pittsburgh airport, painstakingly laying out pieces of wreckage on the floor in the shape of an airplane.

Investigators are piecing together the thousands of shattered, blackened shards of USAir Flight 427, trying to determine why it crashed.

A piece of silver fuselage con-

tained a couple of window frames with the glass missing. Part of USAir's logo — the bright red painted letters "U" and "S" — could be made out on another piece from the side of the plane. The plane's tail rests in the rear

of the hangar.
Some of the larger pieces are the size of a small car. The smallest ones, piled in dozens of laundry-basket-size bins, are mere splinters.

"We are looking for fractures. We are looking for punctures. We are looking for stress in the metal," National Transportation Safety Board spokesman Michael Benson said Wednesday.

So far, federal officials have no explanation why the Boeing 737-300 jetliner suddenly dropped 6,000 feet last Thursday and nose-dived into a ravine at 300 mph. The tremendous force of impact shattered the plane and killed all 132 people on board.

"I can't predict when we'll have something," said chief NTSB investigator Tom Haueter. "We're working quickly, but it does take time."

The New York Post reported today that one of Flight 427's passengers, Paul Olson, was a government drug informant in a witness-protection program, and that investigators are checking whether the jet was sabotaged to silence him.

Haueter hoped to have all the wreckage collected by Friday and to identify a cause for the crash within six months.

Preliminary data from the flight recorder has led investigators to believe that the jet's right wing rose, forcing it to roll to the left and go out of control. They are looking at the plane's spoilers -- wing flaps used to slow a plane in flight or after landing -- and autopilot.

Two theories have been discounted: that thrust reversers were deployed in flight and that an engine came loose.

About 450 people attended a service in Moorestown, N.J. for Capt. Peter Germano, the plane's 45-year-old pilot.

Germano's only brother, Ernest, said the pilot developed a love for flying from their father. He recalled flying over Long Island in a single-engine plane with his older brother.

"We could see forever," Germano said, occasionally choking back tears. "Peter, I will always remember you. You will be there whenever I see an airplane in the sky."

HANOI, Vietnam -- A highlevel U.S. State Department official is meeting with Vietnamese counterparts to discuss the historic opening of the first American diplomatic mission in Hanoi in 40 years.

Peter Tomsen, deputy assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific Affairs, arrived Wednesday at a time of improving relations between the United States and Vietnam.

The last American consulate in Hanoi was closed on Dec. 12, 1955. The U.S. Embassy in Saigon was evacuated on April 30, 1975, when the Communists took control of all of Vietnam.

Tomsen will inspect proposed sites for the U.S. mission and for the future ambassador's residence, sources said. Although the U.S. has not yet officially opened its diplomatic mission some of the 11 State Department officials who will staff it are already in

and is the only official representation the United States has in Vietnam. The MIA office is staffed by about 20 Americans.

Hanoi is also opening a liaison office in Washington at the same time. These offices are a prelude to full diplomatic relations, once the United States is satisfied that the fullest possible accounting of American MIAs has been made.

Tomsen's three-day visit is a follow-up to one by his boss, Assistant Secretary of State Winston Lord, in July. During Lord's visit, Vietnam pledged to intensify its efforts to resolve the cases of American MIAs in return for full diplomatic recognition by the United States and favorable trade status.

Tomsen planned to fly to a site outside of Hanoi on Thursday to observe firsthand a major U.S. operation to recover MIA remains, then meet later in the day with Vietnam's Deputy Minister of Defense Nguyen Thoi Bung.

"Progress continues at a strong They are working out of the level as in the last year," said mal U.S. MIA office, which accounts Army Lt. Col. Melvin E. Richfices.

He said cooperation from the Vietnamese has been "strong."

Richmond said several sets of remains believed to be those cf Americans have been recovered on the current operation. In addition, he said, the Vietnamese had on their own turned in a number of remains, and those are being examined by a U.S. thropologist in Ho Chi Minh City.

The United States lists 2,229 Americans as unaccounted for from the war, including 1,639 in Vietnam, 505 in Laos, 77 in Cambodia and eight in China. Half of the total number were killed in action, even though the remains have not been recovered, U.S. officials said. More than 400 others were lost over the sea and their remains probably will never be recovered, officials

Tomsen is scheduled to meet with Deputy Foreign Minister Le Mai on Friday to discuss the formal opening of the liaison of-

# IRA's cease-fire continues, group expects concessions

BELFAST, Northern Ireland --Senior IRA prisoners in Northern Ireland's top-security prison say they support the group's cease fire as a lasting step away from violence, but expect political concessions in return.

British Prime Minister John Major said Wednesday he still wasn't sure whether the Irish Republican Army's 2-week-old truce would last. He is seeking firm assurances from Sinn Fein, the IRA's political partners, that the truce is permanent before talks could begin.

A night of street violence in Belfast between the mainly Protestant police and hard-line Protestant "loyalists" starkly demon-strated how the IRA's gesture has divided sentiments in Northern Ireland's pro-British majori-

Several people were injured and 10 vehicles hijacked and torched late Tuesday in clashes that began after officers separated

Protestants and Catholics trading taunts and punches at a court hearing for a Catholic accused of attempting to murder a prominent loyalist.

Protestant political leaders met police commanders Wednesday and complained afterward that heavy-handed police tactics would ensure more violence. Police promised an investigation, but said civilians had been bent on starting trouble.

Hard-liners within the pro-British Protestant community suspect the IRA must already have won secret concessions from Britain to make them end their 24-year campaign against British rule of the province.

The reality seems to be more complex. Sinn Fein, long isolated politically, has found faith in a political process that for the first time has won them allies among moderate Catholic nationalists, Irish government leaders and American officials.

Sean Lynch, the IRA's comprison southwest of Belfast, said pealing for an end to the ban.

his men want success for the "unarmed strategy," which he said would last "in all circumstances."

"The big question emerging now is not does the republican movement intend to keep the peace, but does the British government want peace? What bold and courageous initiatives has it taken to match the truly historic nature of the republican decision?" Lynch wrote in a letter published Wednesday.

The IRA prisoners are influential opinion-formers within republican ranks, and were consulted before the IRA announcement Aug. 31 of "a complete cessation of military operations."

The IRA and Sinn Fein leaders are seeking the early release of their side's prisoners. Sinn Fein also insists Britain end the 6-year-old ban on broadcasting the voices of IRA supporters.

Some 300,000 Haitians are in hiding in their country, eager to flee, Clinton said.

"If we do not act, they will be the next wave of refugees at ou. door," he said. "We will continue to face a mass exodus of refugees and a constant threat to stability in our region and control of our

When the Naval Academy invades Doyt Perry Stadium Saturday, the Falcon football team will be looking to bomb them with both an aerial and a ground

Gerry Faust, head coach of the Akron Zips, recently experi-enced BG's explosive offense. Last weekend the Falcons racked up 438 yards in a 45-0 thrashing of the Zips.

For faculty and students who have never attended a volleyball game, Van De Walle offered ample reasoning to potential first-



# San Francisco still waiting on Sanders

SANTA CLARA, Calif. -- Deion Sanders' free-agent odyssey ap-

pears to be nearing an end. San Francisco 49ers president Carmen Policy and Sanders' agent,

Eugene Parker, wrapped up daylong negotiations late Wednesday night after reaching what Policy called a "meeting of the minds" on a

He declined to discuss details of the proposal, which still must be approved and signed by Sanders and reviewed by the NFL Manage-

ment Council to ensure it complies with salary cap regulations. "I think finally at the end of the day what we've submitted should be approved," Policy said. "Will Deion accept it? That's what it boils

A free-agent cornerback and Cincinnati Reds outfielder, Sanders shopped his services to several NFL teams while idled by the monthlong baseball players strike.

Owners on Wednesday called off the season, and with his baseball job wiped out, Sanders turned his attention to football, particularly

Sanders told an Atlanta television station he had decided against rejoining the Atlanta Falcons and intended to sign with the 49ers

'I have a very, very good feeling about this but it's not done 'til it's done," Policy said. "I think they know we've gone as far as we can go [ financially]. We've done all we could do in the framework of a oneyear deal. Everything has been put on the table."

Sanders rejected a more lucrative offer from the Miami Dolphins, plagued by injuries in the secondary and badly needing a reinforce-

"I'm disappointed," coach Don Shula said. "I thought we were in it and had a good chance. We pursued it hard these last few days.

In their bid to sign Sanders, the 49ers freed \$1.3 million under the salary cap by restructuring the contracts of linebackers Gary Plummer and Ken Norton and safety Tim McDonald.

Just two weeks ago, Policy said the 49ers couldn't afford Sanders because of salary-cap constraints. Now he was optimistic the two sides could come to terms. However, he was wary of competing

"We're not in there alone," Policy said. "If I was to stand here and tell you it was done, I would be really acting foolhardy. I don't know what's going on behind the scenes. His coming out here may be nothing more than priming the pump to get Atlanta to really come through with a final offer."

Falcons president Taylor Smith said the team still assumed San-

CLEVELAND - The last thing the Cleveland Indians wanted to do was end their best season in 40 years, but the players believe the owners left them no alternative.

"I think we did the right thing," said pitcher Eric Plunk. "With the changes the owners are trying to make in the basic agreement, we had no choice. It had to be done."

Pitcher Dennis Martinez, a union activist, said he realized fans probably don't understand the players' stance.

"We struck for principle - not for money," Martinez said. "The fans don't think that. But they don't understand the salary cap. We're fighting for our rights. It's like the people in Cuba who are escaping on rafts. They want to be free, and so do we.

"We want to be free to play for what team we want and earn as much as we can," he said. "That's what this country is all about. We all want a chance to better ourselves. With a salary cap, we wouldn't be able to do that."

Despite losing millions of dollars during their strike, players believe their action will pay dividends in the future.

"This isn't helping us now," pitcher Derek Lilliquist said. "But it will help the kids playing Little League and minor league ball right now. We want them to enjoy the same benefits we enjoyed when they get to the big leagues. The players before us

fought for it, and we have to do the same."

But many players still found Wednesday's announcement to cancel the rest of the season difficult to accept.

"I'm a little surprised this happened," Carlos Baerga said. "It's very hard for our team because we've worked so hard all year. And every player dreams of being in the playoffs and World Se-

The players also have to accept that there may not be a next season if an agreement is not

"It's a shame to cancel the season," Candy Maldonado said. "It's bad for the fans, players and owners. Now no one knows what will happen this winter."

# Indians players say Soccer hosts Hilltoppers

The Bowling Green soccer squad will attempt to keep two winning streaks intact Sunday when they host Western Kentucky at Mickey Cochrane Field.

The Falcons (4-1) hope to extend this season's four-game winning streak alive and a career unbeaten streak against the Hilltoppers. BG is 2-0-1 in three career meetings.

Last season, BG defeated WKU 3-1 in the opening round of the Mitre-Classic in Bowling Green, Ky.

After losing their season opener 3-2 to Loyola (Md.), the Falcons have run off four consecutive victories against Coastal Carolina, Dayton, Southern Indiana and Ohio State. The 2-0 victory against the Buckeyes on Wednesday was the Falcons' 21st in 28 meetings.

BG's ball possession and movement has been paramount to its recent success. Midfielder Joe Burch collected two goals against the Buckeyes, his fourth and fifth of the season.

"I'm real happy with the way the team has been knocking the ball around," Burch said. By possessing the ball, the

Falcons are better able to distribute the ball offensively and defensively. BG has outscored its opponents 14-6 in five games for an average of nearly three scored and just over one given up per game. Goaltender Dan Traver currently sports a 3-0 record with a paltry 0.75 goals against average in four

# Cincy linebacker anxious to return Cross country teams

## McDonald ready after knee injury

CINCINNATI - Less than a year after wrecking his knee, linebacker Ricardo McDonald could return to help the Cincinnati Bengals beef up their defense against the run.

McDonald, 24, is testing the surgically rebuilt left knee in practice this week. If all goes well, he could start Sunday at the right outside linebacker spot.

The San Diego Chargers, led by running back Natrone Means, rolled up 166 yards rushing last Sunday in the Chargers' 27-10 win. That dropped Cincinnati to 0-2 and 24th in the NFL against the rush.

The New England Patriots, who play the Bengals on Sunday, lead their running game with 250-pound Marion Butts, the former Chargers star.

McDonald could help the Bengals jam Patriots tight end Ben Coates at the line of scrimmage. Coates is the AFC's leading receiver with 17 catches.

McDonald, a 1992 fourth-round draft pick who became a starter in his rookie season, was inactive for the first two games this season. He is eager to return.

"I'm excited, I've waited a long said McDonald, who played in all four exhibition games. "I would say I'm ner-

Linebackers coach Joe Pascale said McDonald looks as if he has gotten over some of the tentativeness that comes with reconstructive surgery.

McDonald tore the knee liga-ment nine months ago against the Los Angeles Rams, suffering an injury that commonly sidelines players for a year. He missed the season's two final games, but still was Cincinnati's second-leading tackler with 102 tackles.

"I'm ready mentally. I think the two games off were the best thing that ever happened to me," McDonald said.

Bengals offensive coordinator Bruce Coslet dismissed some grumblings by running backs Derrick Fenner and Steve Broussard, and several wide receivers, that they aren't getting the ball

The Bengals have been criticized for not trying to have quarterback David Klingler throw long passes

Fenner carried the ball five times in the first half for 31 yards last week, but carried just twice in the second half. He shrugged when asked about it.

"Sure, I want the ball more. Yeah, I'd like to see us throw down field. That always opens up the running game," Fenner said.

# Gooden fails drug test

NEW YORK - Dwight Gooden, his Cy Youngwinning days a dimming memory and his career already in doubt because of a drug suspension, faces additional disciplinary measures after again failing drug tests.

The New York Mets said Thursday that Gooden "has committed additional violations of both his aftercare program and the commissioner's office drug policy."

"After the investigation has been concluded, including receipt of a report from baseball's medical advisor, a determination will be made regarding Gooden's status," the commissioner's office said in a statement.

"We're still trying to absorb all of this," Ed Lynch, a special assistant in the Mets front office, said during a telephone news conference. He said Gooden's future with the Mets has be-come a secondary consideration.

"Our concern right now is for Dwight as a person, his concern as a human being," Lynch said. "We're rooting for him to get his life back in order.'

Gooden's agent, Jim Neader said the No. 1 priority is to get Gooden's life straightened out, 'then think about baseball after that.'

"I personally think he'd like to play there again," the agent said.

Gooden voluntarily checked into the Smithers Center for treatment of cocaine addiction in 1987 and missed a month of the season. He has been regularly tested since then.

On June 28, he was suspended for 60 days without pay when he failed two random drug

"I'm truly sorry it happened," Gooden said then. "I want to apologize to the club, my teammates and to the people of New York. I want to thank everyone for their past support. I will be back stronger and better. I want to earn your respect back."






## Spare time fillers:

## Corner Grill is Greasy Haven for Late Night Burger Fanatics

A young student, probably a freshman, naive in the ways of Bowling Green's night life wandered into the Corner Grill Friday night. He found a seat, sat down and waited for service. The waitress arrived and the young man, in an innocent voice, asked, "Does this place have a menu?"

What this young man doesn't realize is that The Grill, as it is commonly known, isn't a menu kind of place. Instead a list of a dozen or so items are spelled out in black plastic letters on bulletin boards on both sides of the establishment. The second hand on a big, red square Coca-Cola wall clock keeps pace with the relentless passage of time. A large stainless steel refrigerator towers behind the counter. On top is a sign attached to a hand grenade with a number laced into the pin which simply says, "Compliant Department, take a number. Windows constructed of glass blocks turn downtown Bowling Green into an El Greco landscape. You see, The Grill is as unique as its clientel. It is so many different things to the immense number of people who go in and

out of the one door during any given week.

The Grill is a meeting place. Open 24 hours a day, except Sunday, the smell of eggs, coffee, grease and cigarette smoke permiate the air and tempt the palate. Signs written in neor marker state that loitering will not be tolerated, though The Grill's atmosphere is the perfect catalyst for this forbidden activity. Students can be found studying. Third shift workers, either waiting to go or coming from work, get that last meal in. Police, sitting on worn stools bolted to the floor, take a break with a cup of coffee at the counter. Friends catch up on lost time. A young man and women sit alone in a booth the color of lime sherbert and fall in love over yellow plastic glasses of Cherry Coke.

It's an eating place. If Grill patrons were asked what to order they would say one of two things: the Breakfast Special or the Tater Boy fries. The Breakfast Special is a culinary work of art: two eggs how you like them, toast, homefries and, at an extra charge, bacon, sausage or ham. In short, you will never have anything like this. The meal melts in the mouth. The tongue's taste buds verge on an orgasmic overload with every mouthful. It probably is the best meal in town for only \$1.99. Coffee is extra, but definitely a must. change for a Breakfast Special!" By 2:15 it's standing room only. One guy is in the kitchen frying eggs, dropping Tater Boys into a basket of hot grease, slapping bacon onto the grill. The waitress, typically only one during the busiest times, dance around customers and back and forth from behind the counter with a pot of coffee in one hand and a platter of food in another. Student's feast on their food, get in that last laugh of the evening with their friends and then head home to bed, leaving open another stool or booth for a different set of students and the cycle begins

The Grill has a 50's diner atmosphere. It's a place you expect James Dean or Marlon Brando would have walked in to for a late night cup of Joe and a Camel. To say that The Corner Grill is a greasy spoon is to pay it one of the highest possible comments.

The Grill is a piece of America. It's place you can go where the coffee is always hot, the food always tastes good and the service is as fast as they can get it to you and without any hassel. In an age of fast food, sterile impersonal service and corporate conformity, The Corner Grill provides an

Like if I'm wearing my earring like this (points to his left ear). I see glances. It's not just like people give me an 'I'm-looking-atyou-and-minding-my-own-business look.' The glances are like .. (gives contempt-filled glance). Me and one of my best friends were dancing at Uptown and a guy said take that s- somewhere else. And he's partially deaf and said 'What?' # An on Campus Call of the Wild

## College Life offers Students an ideal environment for Breeding

College is a place of discovery. Personalities emerge, identities unfold and self awareness peaks. It is also a time for a sexual explosion.

Hormones race and newly-developed bodies itch with a desire for the opposite sex. College is the perfect environment for sexual exploration and discovery. For some students, it is the first time in their limited lives that they are away from their parent's watchful eyes. Sexual expression can be vented on the canvas of the Bowling Green nightlife. It would be naive to deny that onenightstands, or "hooking up" do not result after a few drinks, some good lines and the right looks. Sexuality is used here to sate the need for adventure, to orgasm as no one has

orgasmed before.
"People in college are now past their adolesence and their sexuality has become heightened," said Jeanne Wright, University director of health education, "College provides more opportunity for sexual relations without parental consent."

The college atmosphere also allows people to discover their sexual orientation.

Campus life offers a more secure atmosphere for people to "come out."

Wright said statistics show that homosexual males have more a more frequent sexual experiences during their pre adolesent and teen years, while females experiences increase during their late teens to thirties.

Sexual orientation has a wide continuim, Wright said. Very few people are considered exclusively heterosexual or exclusively homosexual. People may have an attraction towards someone of the same sex or prefer to be with the same sex. The question is wether they act on these feelings.

For couples committed in an exclusive relationship, sex is an intimate form a of communication. Others find the absence of sexual relations to be fullfilling.

Sex.

Just the word makes the palms sweat, the pulse quicken and the throat go dry and tight. A taboo has always hovered over the subject of intercourse. The fact is that everyone does or will do at one time or another. The incentive of the orgasm is enough to encourage people to par-take in the forbidden pleasures.

"Sexual activity and arousal raise the endorphine levels in the brain," Wright said. "It's a natural high."

Double standards are always prevelant: a promiscuous male is a hero, a promiscuous female is a whore. It is a fact though that a majority of the college student population, that is people 19 to 21, are engaging in some sort of sexual activity.

"Statistics show that overall, by the age of 20, 80 percent have engaged in sexual intercourse," Wright said.

This leaves a few questions for those who fall into that age group and are sexually active. Is there such a thing as not enough sex, and how much sex is too much sex. Is their a workable definition of a healthy sex life for people 18 to 21?

Wright said the 80 percent statistic is not a definition to base a healthy sex life on, and the frequency of sexual encounters is by no means part of that definion.

She said people should not become frustrated if they are not as sexually active as their peers. Men and women may experience sexual pressure indirectly from more promiscuous friends. They may start to question their abilty to perform in a sexual situation. They start to wonder "if I'm not doing it, can I?" Another form of pressure is generated from myths pertaining to penis and breast size.

"Size has nothing to do with one's ability to perform or to provide one's partner with pleasure," Wright said. She uses an anology of a journey to explain that all good things come with time.

"Imagine your in a car on the freeway and people in faster cars are passing you by." Wright said. "Soon you start to feel frustration because you want to go as fast as they are. A ways down the highway you notice those cars that past you by have crashed on the side of the road and they'll never reach their destination. It may take you longer, but you eventually get to where you want to go."

She streses that everyone should progress at a pace which they feel comfortable. Sexual satisfaction and a healthy sex life is an individualized concept. Wright said some people may feel comfortable living a very promiscuous lifestyle, while others are content in a monogomous relationship or with celebacy.

Writght said it is difficult to define exactly what a normal or healthy sex

life is. She said sexual satisfaction is individualized.

"People use sex for many different things — soley for pleasure, intimacy and even procreation," Wright said, "You've got to know what the boundaries are and feel comfortable with them."

She said she believes the three criteria for a healthy sex life are that it is consensual, satisfying and nonexploitive.

"No one needs to be exploited," she said.

There are other ways for partners to engage in intimacy that don't involve sexual intercourse.

"Sexual intimacy is very healthy." Wright said. "But it does not necessarily mean sexual intercourse with the exchange of bodily fluids. Couples can engage in massage fantasy, exploring each other's body parts and even masturbation."

# Passion Might Burn

The term "sexually transmitted disease" (STD) can refer to more than 20 illnesses, all transmitted through sexual contact, such as the exchange of body fluids - semen, vaginal fluid, and blood. STDs can also be transmitted from a mother to a baby, and some STDs, like herpes, can be transmitted by kissing or by coming in close contact with infected areas.

Anyone who is having sex can get a sexually transmitted disease.

The only way to not contract an STD is to not have sex. If you don't want to give up having sex, you should take precautions to reduce your risk of getting an STD.

- · Having sex with only one faithful and uninfected partner reduces the risk. The risk of contracting an STD increases with the number of partners you have, and increases much more if you have sex with an infected person.
- Always using a condom during all forms of sex (anal, vaginal, and oral) can protect you by preventing contact with skin and bodily fluids that carry infections. Condoms must be used properly and each and every time during sexual intercourse to help reduce the risk of contracting STDs.
- · Since Nonoxynol-9 has been found to kill many STD-carrying bacteria and viruses, use spermicidal foams, creams, and jellies containing this chemical in combination with condoms.
- · Anal sex and oral sex without a condom should not be practiced unless you are having sex with only one faithful and uninfected sexual partner.

Below are ten of the most common STDs, their method of contraction, symptoms, and treatment.

Syphilis is bacteria called "spirochetes" that usually enter the body through sexual contacts. Once inside, they enter the bloodstream and infect vital organs. Syphilis is spread though sexual contact, including oral and anal sex with someone infected with syphilis. Symptoms of syphilis occur in two stages. During the first stage, 1 to 12 weeks after having sex, a painless reddish-brown sore appears in the mouth or on the sex organs. This sore may last up to five weeks, but when it goes away, you still have syphilis. The second stage may show up anywhere from 6 weeks to 6 months later, and includes rashes anywhere on the body and flu-like feelings like sore throat and fevers. Syphilis is treated with large doses of penicillin (or other antibiotic) for as long as needed to kill all the bacteria.

Chlamyida is a virus that causes infections in urinary and reproductive organs: NGU (Non-gonococcal urethritis) in men and PID (Pelvic Inflammatory Disease) in women. Chlamydia is spread through sexual intercourse, including oral and anal sex, with someone infected with chlamydia. In women, the symptoms include discharge and between-period bleeding from the vagina, and pain and burning sensations during urination. Men experience a white discharge from the penis, and pain and burning sensation during urination. Chlamydia is treated with antibiotics.

Gonorrhea is an infection caused by gonococcus bacteria that live in dark, warm, moist places in the body. It is spread through sexual intercourse, including anal and oral sex, with someone who is infected with gonorrhea. Women's symptoms include thick yellow or white vaginal discharge, painful urination, extremely painful periods, and lower abdomen cramps. Men experience a thick yellow or white drip from the penis, and painful or burning sensation during urination. Gonorrhea is treated with antibiotics. Chlamydia often occurs with gonorrhea, so both conditions should be checked at the same time.

Herpes Simplex Virus-II are blister like sores that appear on and in the penis, vagina, and anus; and in some cases in the mouth. It is spread by sexual intercourse, including oral and anal sex with someone infected with herpes. Some people have no symptoms of herpes, but if symptoms do occur, they include flu-like feelings, small painful blisters on the sex organs or mouth, and itching and burning where these blisters appear. There is no cure for herpes. Only have sex between herpes attacks and always use condoms. Never have sex when the herpes is active or in the shedding

AIDS - Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome is caused by HIV, the human immuno-deficiency virus that attacks and destroys the body's immune system, leaving the persons open to infection and many fatal diseases. HIV is spread through sexual intercourse, including oral and anal sex with an HIV infected person. It can also be spread by sharing IV drug needles, and from a mother to her baby while still in the womb or during birth. You may not be able to tell if you are infected with HIV — the only way to find out if you are HIV+ or HIV- is to have a blood test done that detects the presence of antibodies to HIV in your blood. If you are infected with HIV, you do not know when or if you will develop AIDS. At this time, there is no cure for AIDS.

Hepatitis B is the most dangerous of the hepatitis viruses. It is spread by having sex with someone infected with Hepatitis B or from contaminated blood, such as through sharing IV drug needles. Signs of Hepatitis B include loss of appetite, weakness, nausea, vomiting, stomach pain, and yellowing of the skin or eyes. These are signs of liver damage caused by the virus. There is no cure for Hepatitis B, but pills or shots can be given to help control the liver damage. There now exists a Hepatitis B Vaccine that prevents the transmission of the Hepatitis B virus. It is given in a series of three shots over a span of six months.

Venereal Warts are wartlike bumps caused by a virus and grow in both dry and moist areas of the body. Venereal warts are spread during sexual intercourse, including anal and oral sex with someone who has venereal warts. Venereal warts are small, bumpy warts on the sex organs that do not go away. Warts can be removed with special ointment, frozen off with dry ice, or burned off with an electric needle and local anesthetic.

Public Lice or Crabs are parasites that live in the hair around the penis or vagina. Crabs can be passed on though sexual contact, and also from infested towels, bedding, or clothing. Symptoms of crabs include severe itching and blood on underclothes where the crabs have gotten under the skin. Over-the-counter and prescription lotions, creams, and other preparations will kill crabs.

Scables are small bugs that burrow under the skin. Scabies is spread by close sexual contact and close physical contact. Scabies shows itself in reddish zigzag furrows under the skin, usually in the genital areas, and is accompanied by painful itching. It is treated with prescription creams and lotions.

Trichomoniasis is caused by tiny parasites and causes vaginal infections in women and urethra infections in men. It is spread though sexual contact with an infected persons, and damp clothing or towels shared with an infected person. Women's symptoms include greenish-yellow discharge, painful urination, inflammation in genital areas, and lower abdomen pain. Men may experience a discharge from the penis. "Trich" can live in the body for years and never show any symptoms. The medication Flagyl is used to treat trichomoniasis.

The BGSU Student Health Service and the BGSU Women's Health Clinic provide testing and treatment for a wide range of STDs, including herpes, syphilis, and gonorrhea. They also provide free, anonymous HIV testing, which includes pre- and post-test counseling. For more information or an appointment, call the Student Health Service and the Women's Health Clinic at 372-2271. Planned Parenthood (920 N. Main St.) offers STD testing, diagnosis, and treatment for both men and women, with the fee adjusted to income. They also offer free and anonymous HIV testing Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9am to 3pm. For either STD testing or the HIV test, you must call for an appointment at 354-3540.

# Jack Logan Bulk Medium Cool - Twin/Tone Records

When most bands and performers send out demo tapes, they include maybe four or five songs, just enough to give the A&R people a sampling of what their sound is all about. No so for **Jack Logan**. When he sent his demo to Peter Jeperson of **Trein/Tone Records**, it consisted of nearly one hundred songs spread over three tapes. Jeperson was so floored, he began digging through Logan's tape archives of more than 600 songs, recorded over a period of fourteen years. The result is an amazing 2-CD set (neatly packaged in a single CD case) containing 42 songs, running more than two and a half hours long, and appropriated entitled Bulk.

Logan's music runs the gamut from simple guitar-flavored folk tunes ("Heart Attack on the Prairie"), to honkytonk ("Just Go Away"), to fuzzed out distortion ("Opposite Direction"), and blues ("Lazy Girl Blues"). However, there is an overall feeling of gloom hanging over Bulk. Lots of lyrics about broken relationships, isolation, desperation, alcohol (ab)use, and the overall depression of being stranded in the Midwest for a large

## Threesome R, 93 min.

But, **Threesome** manages to be a frequently hilarious sex-themed comedy from the mind of Andrew Fleming (**Bad Dreams**).

Threesome shares with us the lives of two newly acquainted male roommates who after several days in their dormitory suite meet thier third roommate who mistakenly turns out to be a girl named Alex (lara Flynn Boyle, The Temp). The university sees the error but due to a housing shortage they can't do anything about the problem for eight to twelve weks. The three eventually become friends and Alex falls in love with Eddy (Josh Charles, Dead Poets Society) who is confused about his sexuality and can't figure out if he's in love with her.

This sets up an almost endless stream of sexual tension, frustration, and discussion between the three which gets pretty detailed and explicit. But no matter how rough the language is at time, there are always laughs and clever scenes to follow.

Threesome is by no means the greatest movie ever, but it is fairly fresh and original. It also lacks that "teen exploitation" feel of movies like The Breakfast Club and Some Kind of Wonderful. This movie also earns bonus points for being well photographed plus it is edited to the perfect length, never dragging on while at the same time making sure we are not left short.




